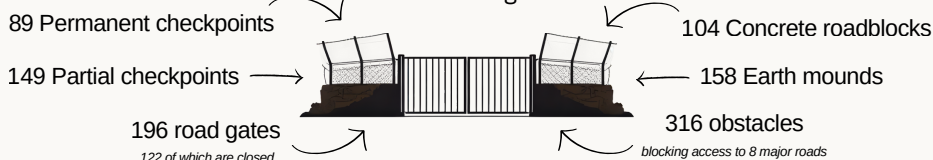


The Architecture of Coercion, Subjugation, and Domination:

Israel's Intensified Movement Restrictions in the West Bank

Physical Infrastructure of Control

There are **at least 849 movement obstacles**, including:



*According to UN OCHA Update (March 2025).**

Impacts

44% of medical permit requests are denied

Cancellation of 100,000 Palestinian workers' permits

150 farming communities are cut off from their land

Obstructions of ambulances have tripled (387 incidents)

Drastic increase in commute times, impacting all aspects of life

Case Studies



Nablus

- 128 military obstacles encircle the city
- Severely impacts 110,000 students and 6,000 teachers
- 60% losses in tourism
- 20% commercial goods are damaged or delayed



Bethlehem

- Most heavily restricted city, with the highest number of Israeli checkpoints
- 47 new military gates across the Governorate
- 30 new cement blocks on agricultural roads that lead to main roads



Hebron

- 28 checkpoints in a small zone under full military control
- 7,000 residents endured a 15-day full closure.
- Schools and the only health clinic were shut for 7 months.



Qalqilya

- Lost access to 100 dunams of prime farmland behind the annexation wall.
- Estimated economic loss: \$1.4 million annually

Tools of Coersion

Flying Checkpoints

Hundreds of temporary, ad-hoc checkpoints create a state of constant unpredictability and fear, not just static control.



Permit System

Movement is a conditional "privilege," not a right. Permits are granted or denied arbitrarily, without justification, making daily life unpredictable.

Population Registry Control

Israel controls the Palestinian population registry, determining legal existence and access to rights based on ID type.

Facial Recognition Technology

"Red Wolf"

System scans Palestinians' faces without consent, adding a layer of digital surveillance to physical control.
